Emerging Wilderness

The Sihlwald is a rare example of a large natural forest, originally common to Central Europe. Since the year 2000, the approximately 11 km² Sihlwald has been left to its own devices – a unique wilderness is emerging. This offers diverse habitats for fungi, plants and animals, including many rare species. As Nature Discovery Park, the Sihlwald combines nature conservation and recreation in close proximity to the cities of Zurich and Zug. The city of Zurich, the canton of Zurich, the municipalities of the district of Horgen and Pro Natura Zurich are the supporting organizations of the non-profit Wildnispark Zurich Foundation.
